Being Salt and Light

Rev. Dr. Brian McClaren, Dean of Core Faculty at the Center for Action and Contemplation, talks about what it means to be Salt and Light, - a transformative presence – in our lives and communities. He references Jesus' Sermon on the Mount.

The Sermon begins with a set of sayings that begin with, "Blessed are..." "Most people, he says, "interpret these statements as a way of saying that God blesses these people – to the exclusion of others, but I've come to understand the Beatitudes as a way of saying something very, very different."

The Beatitudes say that we, in this new movement, bless the very people who are usually excluded. So, Jesus says, in this movement, we bless the poor and the poor in spirit. We bless those who mourn, we bless the meek or gentle. We bless those who hunger and thirst for justice. We bless the merciful and the pure in heart. We bless the peacemakers and those who are persecuted for standing up for justice.

Then Jesus continues by saying, because we bless people who are usually forgotten or despised or excluded, we see the world differently. And that different way of seeing the world leads to a different way of being in the world.

And here are his exact words to describe this:

Salt and Light

¹³ "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste,

how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

¹⁴ "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. ¹⁵ People do not light a lamp and put it under the bushel basket; rather, they put it on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. ¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. ~Matthew 5:13-16 (NRSVue)

In January we spent time with the theme, Radical Resilience. We considered how we can bounce back from setbacks and remain strong in difficult times. Going forward, we would like to go beyond surviving difficult times and focus on being a presence in this world that radiates and flavors the world with divine love. A warm and healing presence to a world that seems often, as a world on fire, so that we can stand in solidarity with the world without burning up or burning out.

Being Salt and Light calls us to live in the flow of action and contemplation. A contemplative way of seeing the world leads to an active way of being in the world as a warm and loving presence, radiant with the light of love and truth, justice and compassion - flavorful as salt, preserving and enhancing all that is good in the world.

As we respond to the worlds ongoing struggles with justice and compassion, we're also invited into a deep stillness that refines our loving presence, empowering us to embody light and hope amid life's uncertainties.

Friends, as we move forward into 2025, may I just say: Welcome to being Salt and Light.



Dear Siblings in Christ,

As we step into this season after the Epiphany, our lectionary quickly moves us from the journey of the magi to the baptism of Jesus. We would be remiss, however, were we to not note the journey of the Holy Family that speaks powerfully to our shared calling as followers of Christ. We must remember how Mary, Joseph, and the infant Jesus fled to Egypt, seeking refuge from violence and persecution. We must pay attention to how they became strangers in a foreign land, reliant on the hospitality and compassion of others.

You are invited to take a moment to reflect upon how when the time came and it was safe for them to return, the Holy Family settled in Nazareth, where Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, preparing for the moment he would step into the Jordan River to be baptized. Recall how in his baptism, Jesus identified with the vulnerable, the weary, and the displaced, claiming his identity as God's beloved and beginning his mission to proclaim good news to the poor, release to the captives, and freedom for the oppressed.

Reflecting on Jesus' story through this lens brings us to a place of application—seeing how the plight of migrants, immigrants, and refugees in our midst today calls us to live out this same mission with urgency and love. As a church, we are called to welcome the stranger, remembering that in doing so, we welcome Christ himself (Matthew 25:35).

Recently, the Council of Bishops shared a letter that included the following reflection, "For decades, a broken immigration system in the U.S. has kept migrants, immigrants, and refugees in this country living in the shadows of society in a state of perpetual fear. They have come to the U.S. under forced circumstances—fleeing extreme poverty, hunger, political and religious persecution, war, cartel and gang violence, and the severe impact of climate change. Some are actively recruited by large U.S. companies who need their labor. Yet migrants, immigrants, and refugees help to sustain the U.S. economy, serve our families, care for our children and our elderly, clean our homes, landscape our properties, build our roads and the houses we live in, and cultivate and pick the crops that feed our families. They are our neighbors, our friends, and members and pastors of our churches."

In this moment in history, we are called to remember the part of the Jesus story that tells when he and his family fled in fear, became refugees, and made home in a foreign land. We are called to note that there are times then and now where it is not safe to be a stranger in a foreign land—even if the land of which we speak is where we call home.

As we build beloved community with the migrants, immigrants, and refugees in our midst, we must be reminded of our baptismal vows and to embody the light of Christ in a world darkened by division, hatred, and fear—paying particular attention to the "Renunciation of Sin and Profession of Faith":

1. Renunciation of Sin

"Do you renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness, reject the evil powers of this world, and repent of your sin?" (Response: "I do.")

2. Acceptance of God's Grace

"Do you accept the freedom and power God gives you to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves?" (Response: "I do.")

3. Profession of Christ as Savior

"Do you confess Jesus Christ as your Savior, put your whole trust in his grace, and promise to serve him as your Lord, in union with the Church which Christ has opened to people of all ages, nations, and races?" (Response: "I do.")

Dear ones, The Council of Bishops has called us to live out our baptismal vows and live into the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church. These principles include:

- Affirming the dignity, worth, and rights of migrants, immigrants, and refugees.
- Recognizing that displaced people are particularly vulnerable as their in-between status often provides them with few protections and benefits, leaving them open to exploitation, violence, and abuse.
- Urging one another to welcome migrants, refugees, and immigrants into our congregations, providing concrete support to them, including help navigating restrictive and often lengthy immigration policies, and assistance with securing food, housing, education, employment, and other kinds of support.
- Opposing all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize, or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants, or refugees.
- Decrying attempts to detain displaced people and hold them in inhumane and unsanitary conditions.
- Challenging policies that call for the separation of families, especially parents and minor children.
- Opposing the existence of for-profit detention centers that are used for the purpose of detaining migrants, immigrants, and refugees, including minor children.

Across the Dakotas-Minnesota Episcopal Area, let us join the invitation of the Council of Bishops who have called upon the people of The United Methodist Church "to pray for migrants, immigrants, and refugees among us and to welcome them with the fullness of Christian love, remembering that as we welcome these, our brothers and sisters, we welcome Jesus our Lord."

Quilters Invite You to "Strip, Crumb, Exploding and Iced Dyeing" Days

The Threads of Love Quilters encourage the women of HUMC to join them for four upcoming special events. You do not need to be a quilter to participate; just come for the fun and fellowship. They are as follows:

February 4 Let's Strip (our scraps, of course!)

February 18 Crumb Block Craziness
March 4 Exploding Strip Blocks

March 11 (tentative) *Iced Dyeing*

"When we cleaned out the storage room for the painters in January, we sorted fabric and decided to use the smaller pieces of fabric in new and innovative ways," explained Mary Takle, coordinator for the group, whose mission is to make quilts that will "bring care and comfort to those in need."

For the February 4 event, participants are invited to bring their fabric scraps and join in the fun.

"We will learn how to use stripology rulers to quickly create blocks and strips for future quilts," said Mary. "We will also sort our smaller scraps by color in order to prepare for making crumb blocks on February 18 and strip blocks on March 4."

On March 11, Beth Holland will demonstrate "Iced Dyeing" techniques, a process using ice cubes and powdered dye to color fabric, which will then be used to make more quilts.

The Threads of Love Quilters meet on Tuesdays from 9:30 am to 3 pm in the Fellowship Hall, breaking at noon for lunch (BYO), and devotions. Please join them for part of the day or all day. Everyone is welcome!



Happy 135th Anniversary HUMC! January 18, 1890

Bible Verse: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am also." Matthew 18:20

In 1879, exhausted from their long journey, a small group of homesteaders arrived on the Hubbard prairie, looked at the fertile land, and said, "Here we are."

These hard-working pioneers struggled to survive, yet they found time to worship in each other's homes. On January 18, 1890, a group of 57 men and women gathered to pray, write and sign a charter for what is now known as Hubbard United Methodist Church.

In May 1890, with the ground finally frost free, building began. By July, the framework of the first Methodist church to be built in Hubbard County stood proudly silhouetted against the summer sky. Work continued throughout the fall and one year to the day from when the charter was signed, the church was dedicated.

Let's fast forward 100 years—times were changing! When the congregation reviewed its mission, they realized they were most successful in their outreach to those 55 and older, those who vacationed on our lakes or retired "Up North." In increasing numbers, these retirees came to HUMC and said, "Here I am, what can I do." They served as ushers and greeters, joined the choir, quilted, biked, supported mission projects, and gave generously of their time and resources.

In 2003, with the church bursting at its seams, the congregation voted to build a new church. The first worship service was held in this church on August 14, 2005. The original church was moved several blocks and is now part of the Hubbard Long Lake Theater complex.

Our pastor, Lauren Hauger, the 55th minister to serve this congregation, began her ministry just as the pandemic changed our lives forever. Under her leadership the church moved quickly into the technological age, establishing and expanding a vital on-line ministry to hundreds of women and men throughout the local community and beyond.

One thing has not changed—we continue to be a welcoming, inclusive, Christ-centered community, focused on the gospel, mission and music.
